Le livre noir de la Révolution française Renaud Escande, 2008 Légitimes et glorieux, festifs et fraternels, fruits d'une « raison » attendue par les siècles : c'est ainsi que sont habituellement présentés les événements de ce qui fut aussi l'une des périodes les plus sanglantes de l'histoire, inaugurant tragiquement une succession de révolutions et de conflits qui marquèrent l'Europe jusqu'au milieu du XXe siècle. Il est toujours dans l'intérêt d'une nation de faire briller quelques mythes fondateurs et dans l'intérêt de ceux qui ont pris le pouvoir de masquer la violence et l'arbitraire sur lesquels ils ont assis leur domination. Elle entraîna avec elle, sur le phénomène révolutionnaire, toute une série d'œuvres et de réflexions critiques dont on dénie trop vite, souvent, la légitimité.--

The Liberal Delusion John Marsh, 2012 Is western civilisation based on a mistaken understanding of humanity? Fundamental to any society is its comprehension of human nature. It shapes attitudes and policies on a whole range of issues: interpersonal relations, child-rearing, discipline and punishment, economics and welfare. For millennia western societies were based on the idea that human nature is flawed. This was turned upside down 300 years ago during the Enlightenment by writers such as Rousseau, who argued that we are born good and later warped by parents and society; a liberal view of human nature which is now being challenged by scientific discoveries in the fields of the mind, the brain, and genetics (including the Human Genome), evolutionary psychology, and anthropology. This fundamental change has had profound effects. If we are essentially good then we can safely maximize freedom and abandon morality, religion and tradition. Many aspects of life have been liberalised - sexual behaviour, alcohol consumption, censorship, gambling, divorce laws and economic activity. Economic liberals thought free markets were rational and good and favoured minimal government interference and light-touch regulations. This led to the credit crunch and the greatest financial crisis since World War Two. Many parents now hesitate to discipline their own children. The belief that we are essentially good but corrupted by society has also influenced penal policy. Liberals see criminals as victims, not as wrongdoers; because surely no-one would choose to do something wrong. This is a world far removed from the self-sacrifice and fraternity shown during World War Two. It has not brought happiness but rather more alienated individuals. The outcome of egalitarian aims or methods has often missed its mark: e.g., in education it has led to the dumbing down of academic standards, grade inflation and a decline in social mobility. Egalitarian regimes from the French Revolution to the Soviet era have been amongst the most bigoted, brutal and bloody in history. The drive for greater social justice and fairness must remain an essential objective. There is, therefore, an urgent need to separate out the positive from the negative aspects of liberal thought and

practice, as otherwise there is the risk of descent into moral anarchy and social disintegration.

Broken Altars Thomas Albert Howard, 2025-03-25 A sweeping history of the violence perpetrated by governments committed to extreme forms of secularism in the twentieth century. A popular truism derived from the Enlightenment holds that violence is somehow inherent to religion, to which political secularism offers a liberating solution. But this assumption ignores a glaring modern reality: that putatively progressive regimes committed to secularism have possessed just as much and often a vastly greater capacity for violence as those tied to a religious identity. In *Broken Altars*, Thomas Albert Howard presents a powerful account of the misery, deaths, and destruction visited on religious communities by secularist regimes in the twentieth century. Presenting three principal forms of modern secularism that have arisen since the Enlightenment—passive secularism, combative secularism, and eliminationist secularism—Howard argues that the latter two have been especially violence-prone. Westerners do not fully grasp this, however, because they often mistake the first form, passive secularism, for secularism as a whole. But a disconcertingly more complicated picture emerges with the adoption of a broader global vision. Admitting different species of secularism, greater historical perspective, and case studies drawn from the former Soviet Union, Turkey, Mexico, Spain, Czechoslovakia, Albania, Mongolia, and China, among other countries, Howard calls into question the conventional tale of modernity as the pacifying triumph of secularism over a benighted religious past.

The Imaginary Revolution Michael M. Seidman, 2004-08 The events of 1968 have been seen as a decisive turning point in the Western world. The author takes a critical look at May 1968 and questions whether the events were in fact as revolutionary as French and foreign commentators have indicated. He concludes the student movement changed little that had not already been challenged and altered in the late fifties and early sixties. The workers' strikes led to fewer working hours and higher wages, but these reforms reflected the secular demands of the French labor movement. May 1968 was remarkable not because of the actual transformations it wrought but rather by virtue of the revolutionary power that much of the media and most scholars have attributed to it and which turned it into a symbol of a youthful, renewed, and freer society in France and beyond.

L'émancipation des noirs dans la révolution française Jean-Daniel Piquet, 2002-01-01 Le 16 Pluviôse an II-4 février 1794 la Convention vote l'émancipation des Noirs dans toutes les colonies françaises, c'est-à-dire leur droit à la liberté et à la

citoyenneté. Bien qu'étant la première abolition dans l'histoire du monde, et la seule à s'être avérée inconditionnelle, elle a été presque systématiquement dénigrée. Elle aurait été votée pour des raisons circonstanciées par une minorité de députés, eux-mêmes peu enthousiastes. A partir des nombreux documents produits par l'immense révolution du papier née en 1789, journaux, brochures, - mais aussi archives de gouvernement ou de police - cet ouvrage montre que le retard - très relatif en comparaison de celui d'autres abolitions - mis à appliquer des principes proclamés universels (droit des esclaves à la liberté et droit des mulâtres à l'égalité avec les blancs) - s'explique essentiellement par les contradictions qui parsèment la Révolution lesquelles soulignent pendant ces 4 ans et demi le facteur idéologique de défense du droit naturel. Ainsi le décret du 15 mai 1791, dont les historiens ont systématiquement surévalué les limites, constitue à la fois l'aboutissement et le point de départ de mouvements de solidarité avec les Noirs. De 1789 à 1791, les Amis des Noirs, - essentiellement les futurs Girondins -, Brissot, Clavière, Lanthenas, Pétion, Mirabeau, sensibilisent l'opinion avec vigilance et arguments très appuyés, mais qui souffriront des apostasies ou abandons successifs de figures prestigieuses telles que les Lameth, Lafayette, Sieyès, Duport. Au contraire d'une idée reçue des pamphlets antiesclavagistes thermidoriens, le mouvement comprend aussi à partir de 1791 nombre de futurs montagnards. Ainsi à l'annonce de l'insurrection de Saint-Domingue, des patriotes clament la convergence des deux révolutions, métropolitaine et coloniale. Ils ont pour nom Chaumette, Marat, Dubois-Crancé, Merlin de Thionville, Brival, Lequinio. L'abbé Grégoire et le journaliste Milscent sont aussi de grandes figures de cette abolition ; après avoir été proches en 1791 des Girondins ils se rapprochent en 1793 des Montagnards dans cette radicalisation. De son côté, de mai 1791 à juillet 1794 Robespierre a gardé une cohérence anti-colon comme le montre son avant-dernier rapport inédit. Tous, Girondins, Montagnards et Thermidoriens revendiquèrent un certain anticolonialisme qui, tout en récusant la plupart du temps l'indépendance des colonies, défendait le droit du premier occupant, le mulâtre dans les îles, le Noir en Afrique. Ce continent, il était hors de question pour ces abolitionnistes d'aller le conquérir comme le souhaitaient les colons blancs, comme substitut à l'émancipation.

The Journalists and the July Revolution in France Daniel L. Rader, 2013-11-11 The July Revolution of 1830 in France overthrew the King, brought down the Bourbon dynasty, and ended the fifteen-year era known as the Restoration. It

established the July Monarchy of Louis-Philippe, citizen King of the House of Orleans, a regime also destined for extinction eighteen years later. Although the 1848 revolt is of somewhat greater domestic political importance and considerably greater in its European scope and its social implications, the July Revolution of 1830 should not be relegated to the lower levels of historical consciousness. Yet, in modern times, even in France, relatively few works have been published concerning either the Restoration or the revolution which terminated it. New interpretations, such as the excellent works of Bertier de Sauvigny and David Pinkney have awakened the enthusiasm of scholars; but in general, the intrinsic importance of this period has been slighted for nearly a century. There are reasons for this inattention: At first glance, the era seems retrograde, born of a conservative reaction; and placid - it falls between Napoleon's giant earthquake on one side, and on the other, the dynamics of European nationalism, imperialism, and the class struggle. But the Restoration was neither archaic nor calm. It was, for all its manifest anachronisms, an age of rapid political, cultural, and social growth. France, during these years, was maturing and ripening toward nationhood - and toward the collision of many complex forces, culminating in revolution.

Friedrich Gentz 1764-1832 Raphaël Cahen, 2017-11-20 Diese Studie widmet sich einer der interessantesten europäischen Persönlichkeiten im Zeitalter der Revolutionen. Friedrich Gentz' romanhaftes Leben (Albert Sorel) hat viele Interpreten, wie Golo Mann und Paul Sweet, angezogen, aber auch Verwirrung gestiftet. Darüber hinaus sind wesentliche Aspekte seiner Aktivitäten bisher noch unerforscht geblieben. Hier betritt diese Studie Neuland, indem sie die Komplexität wie auch den visionären Charakter des Gentzschen Denkens zum ersten Mal erschöpfend darstellt. Diese Neubewertung resultiert aus einer intensiven Auseinandersetzung mit Gentz-Schriften und -Quellen, die aus der Gentz-Sammlung Herterich in Köln und mehreren europäischen Archiven stammen. Nach einer bibliographischen und biographischen Einleitung wird Gentz in die philosophisch-politischen Debatten seiner Zeit eingeordnet, wo er als Post-Aufklärer, Rationalist und Wirtschaftsliberaler erscheint. Die Verbreitung der Werke von Gentz in Europa sowie sein erstaunliches Netzwerk werden erläutert. Der Kern des Gentzschen Oeuvres - seinen Ideen zum europäischen Gleichgewicht und zur Annäherung von gegensätzlichen gesellschaftlichen Kräften - wird durch innovative Beispiele zum Völkerrecht (bzw. Seerecht) analysiert. Schließlich werden die Kontinuitätslinien und die innere Konsistenz des Reformoptimismus der späten Aufklärer in den Jahren nach dem Wiener Kongress dargestellt.

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
