So I pulled out all of the unused stories and created an ALL NEW framing sequence that tied them all together... and that's when I realized there would be an eighth book: THE DRAGON KNIGHT. It consists of stories of many of the characters and places my readers already know and love, including The Littlest Knight and the Last Dragon, Mr. Tummeler's Grand Day Out, and more, as well as the TRUE story of how John, Jack, and Charles became Caretakers, and the long-awaited novella about Don Quixote and the Keep of Time, The Thin Man and the Queen of Stars.
