The Youth Experience Gap Francesco Pastore, 2014-08-25 "The education to work transition of young people is key to a successful work-life and to fight youth unemployment. The book provides an impressive outline of the facts and convincing insights of the potential causes. This offers a large and broader audience help to adjust properly to achieve a better life." Klaus F. Zimmermann, IZA, Bonn, Germany This work points to the youth experience gap as a key concept to explain the meager employment opportunities and earnings many young people face. The transition from education to work remains a long dark tunnel around the world. However, this book shows that there are striking differences between countries: in Germany, the young people of today are no worse off than their adult counterparts, while in Southern European and Eastern European countries they fare 3 through 4 times worse. The current economic and financial crisis has further exacerbated the situation for young people in many advanced economies. Observers are divided as to the optimal design of youth employment policy. Liberalists believe that the market itself should address youth disadvantages. More flexible labor markets should also guarantee greater labor turnover, including temporary work, so as to allow young people to move from one job to the next until they accumulate the work experience they need to become more employable and find the right career. In contrast, other economists oppose approaches focusing on entry flexibility and temporary work, claiming that the former type helps only the most skilled and motivated target groups, while the latter only allows young people to gather generic, not job-specific work experience.

Unemployment divergence and unemployment club convergence have been touched on in a large number of works and have recently also been studied using spatial econometric analysis. In this book we aim to develop the debate to include several important new topics, such as: the reasons why structural changes in some sectors cause slumps in some regions but not in others; the extent to which agglomeration factors explain regional imbalances; the degree of convergence / divergence across EU countries and regions; the role of labor mobility in reducing / increasing regional labor market imbalances; the impact of EU and country-level regional policy in stimulating convergence and the (unsatisfactory) role of active labor market policy in stimulating labor supply in the weakest economic areas.

A chapter is also devoted to the inventive costumes of the comic chorus. Going beyond describing what costumes looked like, the book focuses instead on the dynamics of costume as it is manipulated by characters in the performance of plays. The book argues that costume is used competitively, as characters handle each other's costumes and poets vie for status using costume. This argument is informed by performance studies and by analyses of gender and the body.

Widow City Anna Wainwright, 2025-05-13 *Widow City: Gender, Emotion, and Community in Renaissance Italy* investigates the ever-evolving role of the widow in medieval and early modern Italian literature, from canonical authors such as Dante, Petrarch, and Boccaccio, to the numerous widowed writers who rose to prominence in the sixteenth century—including Vittoria Colonna, Veronica Gambara, and Francesca Turina—and radically changed the conversation on public mourning. Engaging with broader intellectual discussions around gender, the history of emotions, the politics of mourning, and the construction of community, *Widow City* argues that widows served as key models demonstrating to readers not just how to mourn, but how to live well after devastating loss. At the same time, widows were figures of great anxiety: their status as unattached women, and the public performance of their grief, were viewed as very real threats to the stability of the social order. They are thus key to broader intellectual understandings of community and civic life in the Italian Middle Ages and Renaissance.

Scott passeggia per il campo di battaglia a combattimento finito: terra sventrata, carri armati bruciati, cadaveri. Volgendo lo sguardo a quello scempio, esclama: «Come amo tutto questo. Che Dio mi aiuti, lo amo più della mia vita». È eloquente che James Hillman abbia scelto proprio questa scena, tanto spiazzante quanto rivelatrice, per introdurre il provocatorio tema del suo nuovo libro: la guerra come pulsione primaria e ambivalente della nostra specie – come pulsione, cioè, dotata di una carica libidica non inferiore a quella di altre pulsioni che la contrastano e insieme la rafforzano, quali l'amore e la solidarietà. Il presupposto è che se di quella pulsione non si ha una visione lucida ogni opposizione alla guerra sarà vana. Frantumando la retorica degli adagi progressisti – basati su una lettura caricaturale della «pace perpetua» teorizzata da Kant –, Hillman risale così, in perfetta consonanza con la sua visione della psicologia, al carattere mitologico e arcaico di tale ambivalenza, riassunto nell'inseparabilità di Ares e Afrodite. In questa prospettiva tutte le guerre del passato e del presente appariranno quindi semplici variazioni della guerra più emblematica dell'Occidente classico, quella cantata nell'«Iliade». Ma soprattutto, ricorrendo a dettagliati rapporti dal fronte, a lettere di combattenti, ad analisi di esperti in strategia – oltre che a tutti gli scrittori e tutti i filosofi che alla guerra hanno tributato meditazioni decisive, da Twain a Tolstoj, da Foucault a Hannah Arendt –, Hillman ci guida a una scandalosa verità: più che un'incarnazione del Male, la guerra è in ogni epoca – lo dimostra la contiguità tra le descrizioni omeriche e i reportage dal Vietnam – una costante della dimensione umana.
