Modern Italian Poets Jacob Blakesley, 2014-02-24 In 1948, the poet Eugenio Montale published his *Quaderno di traduzioni* and created an entirely new Italian literary genre, the “translation notebook.” The quaderni were the work of some of Italy’s foremost poets, and their translation anthologies proved fundamental for their aesthetic and cultural development. *Modern Italian Poets* shows how the new genre shaped the poetic practice of the poet-translators who worked within it, including Giorgio Caproni, Giovanni Giudici, Edoardo Sanguineti, Franco Buffoni, and Nobel Prize-winner Eugenio Montale, displaying how the poet-translators used the quaderni to hone their poetic techniques, experiment with new poetic metres, and develop new theories of poetics. The Flowers of Evil Charles Baudelaire, 2021-12-07 On the 200th anniversary of Baudelaire’s birth comes this stunning landmark translation of the book that launched modern poetry. Subsequent editions expanded on the original, including new poems that have since been recognized as Baudelaire's masterpieces, producing a body of work that stands as the most consequential, controversial, and influential book of poetry from the nineteenth century. Acclaimed translator and poet Aaron Poochigian tackles this revolutionary text with an ear attuned to Baudelaire's lyrical innovations—rendering them in “an assertive blend of full and slant rhymes and fluent iambs” (A. E. Stallings)—and an intuitive feel for the work's dark and brooding mood. Poochigian's version captures the incantatory, almost magical, effect of the original—reanimating for today's reader Baudelaire's “unfailing vision” that “trumpeted the space and light of the future” (Patti Smith). The Flowers of Evil / Les Fleurs du Mal : English - French Bilingual Edition Charles Baudelaire, 2018-06-19 *Les Fleurs du mal* (English: *The Flowers of Evil*) is a volume of French poetry by Charles Baudelaire. First published in 1857, it was important in the symbolist and modernist movements. The poems deal with themes relating to decadence and eroticism. This Bilingual English - French edition provides the original text by Baudelaire and its English translation by Cyril Scott. The initial publication of the book was arranged in six thematically segregated sections: 1. *Spleen et Idéal* (*Spleen and Ideal*) 2. *Tableaux parisiens* (*Parisian Scenes*) 3. *Le Vin* (*Wine*) 4. *Fleurs du mal* (*Flowers of Evil*) 5. *Révolte* (*Revolt*) 6. *La Mort* (*Death*) Baudelaire dedicated the book to the poet Théophile Gautier, describing him as a *parfait magicien des lettres françaises* (a perfect magician of French letters). The foreword to the volume, *Au Lecteur* (*To the Reader*), identifying Satan with the pseudonymous alchemist Hermes Trismegistus. The author and the publisher were prosecuted under the regime of the Second Empire as an *outrage aux bonnes mœurs* (an insult to public decency). As a consequence of this prosecution, Baudelaire was fined 300 francs. Six poems from the work were suppressed and the ban on their publication was not lifted in France until 1949. These poems were *Lesbos*; *Femmes damnées* (*À la pâle clarté*) (or *Women Doomed* (*In the pale glimmer...*)); *Le Léthé* (or *Lethe*); *À celle qui est trop gaie* (or *To Her Who Is Too Joyful*); *Les Bijoux* (or *The Jewels*); and *Les Métamorphoses du Vampire* (or *The Vampire's Metamorphoses*). These were later published in Brussels in a small volume entitled *Les Épaves* (*Scraps or Jetsam*). On the other hand, upon reading *The Swan* (or *Le Cygne*) from *Les Fleurs du mal*, Victor Hugo announced that Baudelaire had created *un nouveau frisson* (a new shudder, a new thrill) in literature. In the wake of the prosecution, a second edition was issued in 1861 which added 35 new poems, removed the six suppressed poems, and added a new section entitled *Tableaux Parisiens*. A posthumous third edition, with a preface by Théophile Gautier and including 14 previously unpublished poems, was issued in 1868.
