Estética y pragmática del relato fantástico Juan Herrero Cecilia, 2000 La estética del relato fantástico constituye un reto especial para la mentalidad racionalista del lector contemporáneo y, al mismo tiempo, ejerce sobre él una desconcertante y sutil fascinación, porque este género literario cultiva la sensación de inquietante extrañeza poniendo en confrontación y en ambigua confusión lo vivido y lo soñado, lo natural y lo sobrenatural, lo racional y lo irracional. Al situar al lector dentro de la extraña e inexplicable experiencia vivida por el personaje en el mundo de la ficción, el género de lo fantástico nos hace percibir el lado oculto de las fuerzas misteriosas que dirigen el dinamismo profundo de la vida y explora las dimensiones suprracionales de la enigmática identidad del ser humano. Con los estudios recogidos en este libro, el autor ha puesto de relieve las principales características que constituyen la dimensión estética, dialógica y pragmática del género fantástico. Además de tratar sobre la evolución literaria del género y sobre las principales teorías en torno a la literatura fantástica, el análisis se detiene especialmente en los aspectos relacionados con la organización narrativa y con las estrategias que en ella funcionan para motivar, desde el discurso mismo del relato, la partición y la cooperación interpretativa del lector (dimensión dialógica o interacción comunicativa entre el universo del texto -organizado según una estética específica- y el lector).

Esta idea corriente de lo fantástico se ha piloteado por la reciente popularidad de obras como El Señor de los Anillos o Harry Potter, que ambas fueron grandes sucesos tanto en la versión literaria como en la cinemática. A pesar de esto, la literatura fantástica cuenta con una larga tradición literaria, también y sobre todo en Latinoamérica, aunque este tipo

de literatura no tiene mucho que ver con la definición recién dada. Pero ¿qué es precisamente lo fantástico? ¿Pertencen a este género obras como por ejemplo *El Señor de los Anillos* desde un punto de vista científico? ¿Dónde están sus límites y cuáles son los temas fantásticos? El presente trabajo quiere contestar estas preguntas basándose en el autor argentino Julio Cortázar y especialmente en su cuento *Carta a una señorita en París*. Por el hecho que el autor mismo denominó sus obras como fantásticas sólo por falta de mejor nombre, también será necesario aclarar hasta qué punto se puede aplicar el concepto de lo neofantástico a ellas. Para conseguir esta meta primero intentaré encontrar criterios para una clasificación de obras neofantásticas y luego los aplicaré al cuento *Carta a una señorita en París* así interpretándolo.

Sites of Disquiet Ilka Kressner, 2013-08-15 Some of the most important writers of the twentieth century, including Borges, Cortázar, Rulfo, and García Márquez, have explored ambiguous sites of a disquieting nature. Their characters face merging perspectives, deferral, darkness, or emptiness. Such a space is neither a site of projection (as utopia or dystopia) nor a neutral setting (as the topos). For the characters, it is real and active, at once elusive and transforming. Despite the challenges of visualizing such slippery spaces, filmic experimentations in Spanish American cinema since the 1960s have sought to adapt these texts to the screen. Ilka Kressner's *Sites of Disquiet* examines these representations of alternative dimensions in Spanish American short narratives and their transformations to the cinematic screen. The study is informed by contemporary critical approaches to spatiality, especially the concepts of atopolis (non-space), spaces of mobility, sites of *différance*, of a self-effacing presence, and sonic spaces. Kressner's comparative study of textual and cinematic constructions of non-spaces highlights the potential and limits of inter-arts adaptation. Film not only portrays the sites in ways that are

intrinsic to the medium, but during the cinematic translation, it further develops the textual presentations of space. Text and film illuminate each other in their renderings of echoes, gaps, absences, and radical openness. The shared focus of the two media on precarious spaces highlights their awareness of the physical and situational conditions in the works. Therefore, it vindicates the import of space and dwelling, and the often underestimated impact of surroundings on the human body and mind. Despite their heterogeneity, the artistic elaborations of these ambivalent atopoi all share a liberating impulse: they assert creative and open-ended interactions with space where volatility ceases to be a negative term.
