Con clara vocación crítica, dispara contra las perspectivas que han enaltecido la diversidad ignorando deliberadamente los poderes en juego y las desigualdades sobre las que muchas veces están fundadas las diferencias. Por ello, en estas páginas se trata del fin de los fines anunciados, se postula una reconstrucción del constructivismo y se reponen los sentidos políticos del intervencionismo banalizador. Atento a la heterogeneidad de las sociedades, a los debates políticos y culturales de las últimas décadas, y a los procesos desencadenados por los movimientos sociales, Grimson subraya la necesidad de cambiar las matrices teóricas. Al proponer nuevas miradas sobre la alteridad, la xenofobia, el racismo o los fundamentalismos contemporáneos, redefine una teoría de la cultura. La potencia política de su argumento radica en que apuntala la búsqueda de nuevos acuerdos que impliquen una vida en común y un horizonte socialmente igualitario.

Cañar features one of the areas of greatest human mobility in the entire Andean Region. Drawing on data from in-depth interviews and dialogue-based workshops with indigenous youths, the author shows how migratory processes and forms of self-representation have challenged the idea that ethnic identity is tied to fixed cultural patterns. He further shows how youths' transnational experiences reconfigure generational differences within indigenous communities. In analyzing how transnational life, adultcentrism, gender power dynamics, and institutional discourses intersect in the production of indigenous youths' subjectivities, this book provides an innovative approach to the studies of indigenous peoples and migration.

These two works provide overviews of a Latin American multiculturalism that connects to parallel movements in North America and Europe. Critical Interculturality and Horizontal Methodology in Latin America will appeal to scholars and students who are in need of new ways to comprehend the current strain of multiculturalism and plurality. It offers reflections on how social research can be not only sensitive to the epistemologies and interests of the cultural other, but approach parity and horizontality in dialogue.

Breaking the Boundaries of the Colombian Socio-Racial Order Mara Viveros-Vigoya, 2023-12-19 In Breaking the Boundaries of the Colombian Socio-Racial Order: Black Middle Classes through an Intersectional Lens, anthropologist and intersectional feminist Mara Viveros-Vigoya examines what it means to be Black and middle class in Colombia and how that

meaning has been configured over almost a century of the country's history. By applying an intersectional perspective, this book introduces two important theoretical shifts. First, it challenges the perception of Afrodescendant 'communities' as uniformly impoverished and second, it emphasizes the interconnectedness of class with geographical and historical contexts and with axes of social inequality such as gender, race, and age. Viveros-Vigoya argues that since the inauguration of neoliberal multiculturalism in the 1990s, while Blackness and upward social mobility have become more compatible, it remains to be seen whether we are advancing towards a global agenda of social justice or if we are simply opening some spaces for social and political mobility that serve largely to reproduce the status quo in the name of racial equality.
